My name is Jeremy Wan, and I graduated in Summer 2019 as a Japanese Studies and NanoEngineering double major. I am currently still at UCSD for my master's degree in Chemical Engineering. Before coming to UCSD as an undeclared freshman, I studied Japanese at a Japanese language school in Tokyo for several months. Not wanting to forget what I had learned, I decided to enroll in a Japanese course and placed into the JAPN 140 series.
